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# **Sipekne'katik Band Rights Implementation and Fishery Management Plan**

## **Preamble**

This Sipekne'katik Fisheries Management Plan ("Management Plan") provides clarity on the roles and responsibilities of the Sipekne'katik Band Council and community members with respect to implementing our inherent right to management fisheries.

The Sipekne'katik Fisheries Management Plan is a working document prepared to assist the Sipekne'katik community, Band Council and Fisheries Department in the development and implementation of livelihood fishing activities for Sipekne'katik community members. It has been prepared, adopted and implemented without prejudice to the Mi'kmaq Aboriginal and Treaty Rights and the inherent Rights and interests of Sipekne'katik Band and all members of the Mi'kmaq nation.

The document is built on multiple community meetings, round-table discussions, community surveys and interaction with other First Nations regarding established First Nations Fisheries Management Plans and should be read in its entirety.

The Sipekne'katik Band Council will seek to ensure that this Management Plan is properly and fully communicated amongst Sipekne'katik Band members and with other Mi'kmaq First Nations in the effort to promote compliance and collaboration for the sustainable management of Mi'kmaq fisheries.

For the purposes of clarity, the term 'conservation' means protection and preservation of fisheries resources to ensure the Mi'kmaq Rights are protected in perpetuity.

Similarly, the term 'mentor' means any non-Sipekne'katik Band Member who is hired to provide training and advisory support to Fisheries Department staff, fishers, seafood buyers, or seafood processors from the Sipekne'katik Band.

This Management Plan provides the framework for the management of the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery. A 'livelihood' is more than employment and income which are terms that are often used to limit a livelihood. Livelihood refers to any and all means of securing the necessities of life, including food, water, shelter, clothing and other desirables. A livelihood is made up of the capabilities, activities and assets, including material and social resources that contribute to a means of living in a comfortable, secure, socially and culturally relevant way.

## Fisheries Management Objectives

The Fishery Management Objectives have been defined by the Sipekne'katik Band and adopted by the Sipekne'katik Band Chief and Council. These objectives are consistent with and advance the principles defined in the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and form the basis for fishery decision making within the Sipekne'katik Band. The Objectives for the Sipekne'katik Fishery are as follows:

1. To ensure conservation of the resource to protect and exercise Mi'kmaq Treaty and Aboriginal Rights<sup>1</sup> to harvest natural resources for the benefit of the community and its members.
2. To alleviate family poverty and advance the size and security of the middle class within the Sipekne'katik community
3. To ensure community adherence to the traditional Mi'kmaq principles of Netukulimk<sup>2</sup>.
4. To contribute to the social and economic well being of the community.
5. To develop and promote livelihood fishing activities that will provide stable and effective<sup>3</sup> employment and income<sup>4</sup> for community members.
6. Provide food to meet the nutritional and social needs of local Sipekne'katik Band members.
7. To ensure the public and harvester safety are protected.
8. To have economically self-sufficient fishing operations, including management and administration.

The Sipekne'katik Band has adopted gender equity principles for the fishery. Accordingly, efforts will be undertaken to avoid any gender barriers in the implementation of all fishery related activities.

This Management Plan, and the associated Fishery Harvesting Plans do not abrogate or derogate from the covenant chain of Mi'kmaq Treaties as such do not and should not be interpreted as limitation on the Treaty and Aboriginal Rights of the Sipekne'katik Band or its members.

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<sup>1</sup> Protection of Treaty and Aboriginal Rights is dependent upon the sustainability of the resource; therefore, resource conservation is a priority management objective.

<sup>2</sup> Netukulimk involves achieving and protecting adequate standards of community nutrition and economic well-being without jeopardizing the integrity, diversity, or productivity of our environment.

<sup>3</sup> Effective employment is defined as employment that will provide income levels sufficient to meet the moderate needs of fishers and their families.

<sup>4</sup> Effective income may be derived from multiple activities to which fishery incomes form part.

## **Development of the Annual Fisheries Harvesting Plan and Coming into Force of the Species Harvesting Plans**

1. The Sipekne'katik Band Council will establish a Local Fisheries Management Committee ("Management Committee") to monitor and oversee the implementation of the Management Plan. The Sipekne'katik Fisheries Director ("Fisheries Director") or his/her designate will act as the Chair of the Committee.
2. The Fisheries Director will prepare resource materials and hold public meetings for the purpose of establishing, where appropriate, common procedures, criteria and objectives for Livelihood fisheries management.
3. Prior to the month of March of each year, the Management Committee shall prepare a Draft Fisheries Harvesting Plan ("Harvesting Plan") to govern natural resources management and fishing activity for the current year. The Harvesting Plan will contain harvesting information for each species of fish or marine resource that is to be harvested for that calendar year or fishing season and identify all recommended Livelihood Fishery allocations. For greater certainty, the contents of the Harvest Plan will include:
  1. Statement of the Community's Fisheries Objectives
  2. Rules and regulations concerning eligibility to access the Sipekne'katik Band fishery
  3. Species-specific harvest regulations and procedures for each livelihood fishery
  4. Marketing guidelines/procedures
  5. Vessel allocation rules and procedures
  6. Community support activities (contributions for development support)
  7. Food fishery rules and regulations
  8. Conflict resolution procedures
  9. A list of fishers designated for the current year, including details of the individual allocations
  10. The time period of which the harvesting of the resource will take place, and the location.

The Harvesting Plan shall be posted in plain public view in the Band Office and published in the Sipekne'katik community newsletter.

4. When the Band Council is satisfied that the membership has been consulted on the Fisheries Harvesting Plan, the Council shall by Resolution adopt the Harvesting Plan for each species for the current year, and by Resolution amend this Management Plan to incorporate the Harvest Plan as a separate Schedule to this Management Plan.

5. After adopting the Fisheries Harvesting Plan(s) for the current year, the Council shall ensure that the adopted Fisheries Harvesting Plan(s) are posted in plain and public view in the Band Office and are published in a Newsletter and is communicated, prior to the first day of fishing, to the membership and to such interested governments and interested user groups as the Council considers appropriate.
6. The Fisheries Director will post a public community notice seeking applications from Sipekne'katik Band members to participate in the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery in accordance with the Fisheries Harvesting Plan and will accept written applications from Sipekne'katik Band members for access to the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery at the Sipekne'katik Fishery Department Office. The time and duration of public notice will be commensurate with the harvesting seasons for each species.
7. All applications shall contain, as a minimum:
  - a. the names of the of all persons who will be involved with the access allocation (captain and crew);
  - b. intended species to be harvested;
  - c. intended location of the fishing activity;
  - d. start and end date of fishing, name and specifications of the vessel;
  - e. number of traps or alternative fishing equipment;
  - f. name of buyer;
  - g. vessel registration number, and/or description of vessel;
  - h. proof of vessel insurance;
  - i. and name and role of any mentor/trainers who will be involved with the fishing activity.
8. Complete applications will be reviewed by the Management Committee within two weeks of application. Written notice of approval or disapproval will be provided to the applicant by the Fisheries Director.

## **Region of Application**

9. This Management Plan and the Fisheries Harvesting Plans for each species annexed as a separate Schedule shall apply in and throughout the watersheds within the traditional territory occupied by the members of the Sipekne'katik Band, including all rivers, streams, brooks, lakes, embayments, estuaries, within the traditional territory of Mi'kmaki and all near shore banks, offshore banks and all other ocean space adjacent to Mi'kmaki.
10. It is understood by Sipekne'katik that the Mi'kmaq were a semi-nomadic people who occupied on a seasonal basis all Mi'kmaki. Therefore, the Region of Application of this Management Plan is within the traditional territory comprised

within the region now known as the Atlantic Province (traditional districts of Sipekne'katik, Kespukwitk, Eskikewa'kik, Epekiwitk Agg Piktuk, Unama'kik, Sikniht and Kespek).

11. This region of applicability is a shared jurisdiction with other Bands and with the federal and provincial governments and will require effective communication and the development of collaborative arrangements to ensure the effective implementation of the Sipekne'katik Fishery Management Plan.

## **Management Regime**

12. The Sipekne'katik Band Council shall be solely responsible for the implementation of the Fisheries Harvesting Plan as provided in this Management Plan.
13. The Council shall exercise its responsibility in respect of the Fisheries Harvesting Plan.
14. The Sipekne'katik Band Council may enter into co-management arrangements with adjacent governments in the interest of conservation and management of fisheries resources.
15. The Sipekne'katik Band Council shall have responsibility to monitor the fishing activities of the Band members in the territory under its jurisdiction.
16. In the fulfillment of its mandate the Council may:
  - a) Promote traditional values and practices (Netukulimk) that protect the fishery and the environment;
  - b) Conduct resource assessments and inventories;
  - c) Engage in scientific activities for the purpose of establishing harvesting limits;
  - d) Identify special protection zones;
  - e) Conduct restoration and enhancement activities as required;
  - f) Examine alternative harvesting techniques;
  - g) Encourage the development of pre-and post-harvest commercial components to the Band's fishery;
  - g) Establish a livelihood fishery management committee, which will be chaired by the Fisheries Director. The Council at their discretion may invite

representatives from other Mi'kmaq agencies, federal and provincial government departments, or commercial fishers' associations to participate on the committee; and,

- h) Establish governance rules and regulations that will promote fisheries and other resource-based businesses within the community.
- 17. The Sipekne'katik Band Council may employ the necessary professional fisheries management personnel to oversee and implement the community management plan.
  - 18. The Sipekne'katik Band Council may employ the necessary personnel to coordinate scientific activities and to coordinate initiatives with agencies outside of the Band.
  - 19. Personnel employed in accordance with articles 14 and 15 must include Mi'kmaq persons in professional and managerial positions at all levels.
  - 20. Fishers are not and shall not be deemed to be employees or agents of the Sipekne'katik Band nor Sipekne'katik Band Council and shall save harmless the Sipekne'katik Band Council and Sipekne'katik Band.

## **Compliance**

- 21. The Sipekne'katik Band Council shall have the responsibility to promote and encourage compliance with this Management Plan.
- 22. In order to promote and encourage compliance, the Council may:
  - a) Conduct monitoring activities in areas in which Sipekne'katik Band members conduct harvesting activities;
  - b) Conduct patrols, surveillance, investigations; and
  - c) Develop and promote fisheries education programs.
- 23. The Council, through the community management structure, may establish rules concerning monitoring and other measures that duly appointed Band Compliance Officers shall apply in situations of non-compliance with any provision of this Management Plan.
- 24. No person or agency other than a duly appointed Band Compliance Officer shall interfere with or molest the Mi'kmaq in Fisheries harvesting activities pursuant to this Accord, unless requested in writing by the Council.

25. The Sipekne'katik Band Council may enter into a formal arrangement with appropriate private sector companies or federal/provincial government departments to provide compliance control (enforcement) services related to the Sipekne'katik Fisheries Management Plan.

## **Catch Records and Documentation**

26. All Fishers will be required to document the location, catch, and landings of all species fished in accordance with a format determined by the Sipekne'katik Chief and Council or their designate.
27. All Fishers will be required to report the presence of endangered species or other species designated by the Chief and Council observed during fishing activity, particularly North Atlantic Right Whale.

## **Non-Compliance**

28. Any violation to any provision of this Plan recorded by duly appointed Band Compliance Officers shall be placed before the Council for resolution through a community Justice process.
29. If a Fisher is deemed to be in non-compliance, the Band Compliance Officer will take the following actions:
  - For a first instance of non-compliance - Talk to the Fisher about the reasons for the non-compliance; following which the Band Compliance Officer may issue the Fisher a recorded warning; or issue the Fisher a notice of non-compliance identifying the offence incurred and require the fisherman to report to the Band Council.
  - For a second instance of non-compliance or where the first offence is deemed by the Band Compliance Officer to impact directly upon the sustainability of the fishery, the Band Compliance Officer will seize all fishing gear.
30. After the Band Compliance Officer has taken all of the above steps and still encounters non-compliance by that Fisher, any fishing gear owned or used by that Fisher will be removed, cleared, and stored at the owner's expense. The owner or user of the fishing gear will be issued a written notice explaining this action. Fishing gear that has been removed because of repeated non-compliance may be claimed and returned once the situation has been remedied pursuant to a decision of the Band Council, or a duly appointed Tribunal.

31. The Band Council may establish a non-compliance fee schedule, which in addition to the confiscation of fishing gear, will be applied to Fishers found to be in non-compliance with the species-specific regulations set out in the Schedules to this Plan.

## **Resource Allocation and Access**

32. Subject to the other sections in this Part, only limits defined within Fisheries Harvest Plans shall apply to Fisheries harvesting by Sipekne'katik Band members for any given year.
33. No Fisheries allocations shall be established if it is determined by the Sipekne'katik Band Council that the harvesting activities of Band Members are exclusively responsible for endangering fish stocks or wildlife populations.
34. Based on recommendations from the Fisheries Management Committee the Council may for conservation or safety concerns alter the time, duration or areas in which Fisheries harvesting can occur by attachment of an Amendment to this Plan by Annex. The Council will provide public notice of any changes in fishing times, duration or areas that have been incorporated in this Plan by posting the Annex of Amendment at the Band Office in a conspicuous place, and through the issuance of a special community newsletter.
35. The Sipekne'katik Chief and Council will authorize access to the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery through the issuance of Livelihood Fishing Permits to individual Fishers.
36. Permits will be required for each species harvested within the Livelihood Fishery.
37. Permits will not be issued by the Sipekne'katik Chief and Council for:
  - a. Species listed as Species at Risk by the independent Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC)
  - b. Species determined as culturally or environmentally important and of concern to the Sipekne'katik Band by the Chief and Council
38. The Band Council may charge an access permit fee for individual species, as set out in the Schedules to this Management Plan.


## **Use of Resource**

39. The use of all fishery harvests will be for the benefit of Sipekne'katik and its members in accordance with Fisheries Harvest Plan and the principles of Netukulimk.

## **Management Plan Amendment**

40. The Council may, from time to time, be required to amend the Management Plan in whole or part. The amendment process will follow the following procedure:
- a. Amendments will be first discussed, reviewed and finalized by Fisheries Committee and provided to the Chief and Council in draft form;
  - b. The Council will review the recommended draft amendments and either accept, reject or amend the amendments. Where the amendments are reviewed and accepted by the Council, the Council will pass a band council resolution indicating their acceptance of the amendments and the accepted amendments will be prepared for community members;
  - c. Following approval by Council, the draft amendments will be posted in a public and conspicuous place at the Band Office that provides the community members with the opportunity to consider and review the amendments. As well, the amendments must also be provided to the community members, either in a public meeting or in another public format, such as the issuance of a special community newsletter;
  - d. Once the draft amendments have been reviewed by community members, Council will pass a band council resolution indicating their acceptance of the draft amendments to the Management Plan and such amendments will be incorporated into the Management Plan by the Fisheries Director and presented to Council for review and acceptance.

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## **Schedule 1 - Sipekne'katik Livelihood Lobster Fishery**

### **Livelihood Fishery Access and Eligibility**

#### **Guidelines for access to the Lobster fishery:**

1. All lobster fishing operations will work under a sharing arrangement that will contribute to the community. This sharing arrangement will be a flat rate set annually for each season and area by the Fisheries Management Committee.
2. Access will only be provided to Designated Captains upon approval of a written proposal submitted to the Band Council through the Fisheries Director.
3. Only Sipekne'katik Band Members over the age of 18 will be eligible to be Designated Captains or crew.
4. To advance traditional intergenerational knowledge transfer, Sipekne'katik Band Members of 16 and 17 years of age will be authorized to fish in the accompaniment of eligible family members.
5. Proposals to request allocation must include:
  - the name and number of the vessel to be used for the access,
  - the number of traps or alternative fishing equipment that will be used,
  - a list of potential Band crew members to be employed on the vessel,
  - the port from which fishing activity will be conducted,
  - the name and location of the buyer for the catch selected from a list of Fisheries Committee approved buyers, and
  - the names of any non-Band trainers to be employed through the access as mentors, along with detailed mentorship training plan.
6. All Designated Captains will be responsible for the day-to-day operations, under the general supervision of the Fisheries Director.
7. Fishers are not and shall not be deemed to be employees or agents of the Sipekne'katik Band nor Sipekne'katik Band Council and shall save harmless the Sipekne'katik Band Council and Sipekne'katik Band.

8. All vessels used in the Sipekne'katik Fishery must be insured as deemed appropriate and necessary by the Fisheries Director.

**Safety Considerations:**

9. Lobster fishing is designated as a Safety Sensitive Occupation and will accordingly be subject to restrictions on the use of drugs and alcohol. The Committee may require proof of Fit for Work compliance.
10. All individual designated fishers must be 18 years or older. Sipekne'katik Band Members of 16 or 17 years of age may participate in the fisher in the accompaniment of eligible family members

**Eligibility requirements:**

11. All fishers must meet the following criteria:
  1. A member of the Sipekne'katik Band over the age of 18 years.
  2. Possess a valid MED certificate.
  3. Have demonstrated fishing experience<sup>5</sup>.
12. All Designated Captains must meet the following criteria:
  - a) Be a member of the Sipekne'katik Band over the age of 18 years.
  - b) Have a suitable and insured boat and gear available for the coming fishing season<sup>6</sup>.
  - c) Have a demonstrated capacity to operate the vessel to be used for the fishery.
  - d) Have a crew selected and prepared to fish at the start of the fishing season.
  - e) Pass a random drug and alcohol screening test that may be administered from time to time.

**Loss of access:**

13. Specific criteria (indicators) will be determined by the Fisheries Committee to determine whether fishers are fishing to an acceptable manner. In the interim period access may be removed for fishing in a manner contrary to the Band's Management Plan.
14. In the event that there is an accident or incident attributed to proven intoxication by drugs or alcohol the captain and crew will lose access.

<sup>6</sup> All vessels must have a Band approved inspection prior to issuance of access. This inspection will consist of a written expert evaluation of the vessel hull, engine, hydraulics, wiring and navigational systems.

15. Fishing activity will be monitored by the Sipekne'katik Fisheries Director and reported to the Band Council.
16. Fishers who do not fish to an acceptable manner, as determined by the Sipekne'katik Fisheries Director, may have their access to the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery temporarily restricted or suspended.
17. In the instance of repeated instances of improper fishing, the Band Council may permanently remove a Band Member's access to the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery.

**Non-native Participation in the Fishery:**

18. Non-natives will not be eligible to access the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery except as a pre-approved mentor in accordance with a detailed Mentorship Plan prepared by the allocation holder.
19. Mentorship plans will be reviewed and approved or rejected by the Fisheries Management Committee.
20. Mentors may only be involved with individual access allocations for a single season (one year). Based on circumstances and upon request by the allocation holder the Fisheries Committee may review the mentorship results and consider use of a mentor by the allocation holder for a second year.
21. Non-natives will not be permitted to work as crewmembers.

## **Lobster Livelihood Fishery Regulations**

### **General Considerations:**

22. No member shall conduct Livelihood fishing activities without authorization from the Fisheries Director approved by the Band Council. This permit will provide the harvesters name, vessel name, vessel registration number, harvesters Band number and designated fishing season. This permit must always be available on the vessel while conducting fishing activity. Livelihood permits are not transferable.
23. Permits will be issued only to Sipekne'katik Band Members. All fishing activity must be conducted by the permit holder. If the authorized fisher is unable to attend the gear and vessel for medical or other extenuating circumstances, a special authorization can be issued by the Fisheries Director to a designate. Designates must be a member of the Band.
24. All fishers will conduct their fishing activity in a manner that protects the interests and reputation of Sipekne'katik, and safe harmless the Sipekne'katik community, Council, and Fisheries Department.
25. No Band member, who is determined to be qualified and available by the Captain, shall be displaced from a crew to permit non-Band fisher's access to the fishery.
26. Non-native fishers are not permitted to benefit from employment or income from the Sipekne'katik Livelihood Fishery except as approved mentors.
27. Before the commencement of fishing the Council shall establish designated Landing Sites the location of which shall be posted in conspicuous places on the Reserve.
28. No person fishing under the auspices of the Sipekne'katik Band shall land lobsters at any place other than the Landing Sites designated by the Band Council.
29. Before the commencement of fishing the Council shall establish a list of designated buyers to whom vessel captains will be instructed to sell all catches.

### **Harvest Regulation:**

30. Lobster fishing will be by trap, unless otherwise permitted in writing by the Band Council. Written permission shall specify the fishers name and band number,

description of the permitted gear type, amount of said gear that is permitted, and specific fishing period that said gear can be used.

31. The number of livelihood fishery traps permitted by individual fishers will be determined by the Fisheries Committee based on the best available scientific and economic information, and the specific circumstances in the fishing area.
32. Fishers employing a method of fishing lobsters other than traps must always carry permission documents with them while fishing and transporting lobsters caught with the gear for which permission was granted, and show said documents to a Band designated monitor or Guardian upon request.
33. All allocation holders must be on the vessel while fishing activity occurs.
34. All allocation holders must ensure all vessels are equipped with the required safety equipment.
35. All allocation holders must ensure that fishing gear is properly and safely stowed while not actively fishing.
36. All allocation holders must ensure that fishing vessels are fully and properly insured prior to commencement of fishing activities to protect the financial interests of the Sipekne'katik community.
37. All allocation holders must ensure each fisher is properly trained and fully certified and insured prior to commencement of fishing activities.
38. Retention of Lobsters with eggs attached is prohibited.
39. Retention of lobsters of a size less than 81mm or greater than 135mm is prohibited.
40. Retention of molting (soft-shelled) lobsters is prohibited. Areas where molting lobsters have been observed must be reported to the Fisheries Director.
41. Retention of lobsters during closed periods as determined by the Band Council is prohibited. Areas may be closed for periods of time due to conservation or safety considerations, including inclement weather, public unrest, etc.
42. Lobster fishing will be closed in areas when North Atlantic Right Whales have been observed to be present.

#### **Limits and Seasons:**

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43. For the purpose of good governance and fisheries administration, the Sipekne'katik Band will take into consideration the lobster fishing areas used by Fisheries and Oceans Canada for lobster fishery management. Specifically, the Sipekne'katik Band will operate in all the following areas (dates of non-native commercial fishing season are provided for information purposes only):




Figure 1: Map of Lobster Fishing Areas

44. The Sipekne'katik Livelihood Lobster fishery will be conducted in LFA 34 and LFA 33 between the following dates;

Spring Season: June 1 to July 15  
 Fall Season: Labour Day to December 15

No lobster Livelihood fishing will be authorized by Sipekne'katik outside of these seasons.

45. The livelihood fishery trap allocations will be determined by the Fisheries Committee based on the best available scientific and economic information, and the specific circumstances in the fishing area.
46. Unless otherwise determined by the Fisheries Committee, all fishers will be eligible to use lobster traps approved by the Fisheries Director in accordance with the size of the fishing vessel. Namely,

Vessel Size	Trap limit
22 ft (6.7 m) and under	30 traps
23 ft (7.0 m) to 32 ft (9.7 m)	45 traps
33 ft (10) to 43 ft (13.1 m)	60 traps

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44 ft (13.4 m) to 50 ft (15.2 m)

75 traps

47. Where and when Sipekne'katik fishers are operating in an area open for non-native commercial fishing the fisher will be permitted to increase their traps limit by 30 traps for the duration of the commercial non-native lobster season.
48. All fishers will be notified of the specific opening and closing dates by the Fisheries Director.
49. All lobsters harvested by a Band member pursuant to the Plan shall be taken to a designated Landing Site as established by the Fisheries Director and the Band Council, where they will be counted by a Band-designated monitor, or a duly authorized representative of the Band Fishery Administration, who will then issue to the Member a landing slip specifying:
  - a. The date and time of landing;
  - b. The Members name and particulars of his or her designation to fish;
  - c. The weight and number of lobsters landed; and,
  - d. The Monitor or Fisheries Administration representative's name.

**Buyers:**

50. The landing, handling, sale, transportation, processing, and retail of catch shall be conducted in accordance with Sipekne'katik Rights Implementation Fisheries Post-Harvest Policy and Protocol.
51. Notwithstanding Article 50, the Sipekne'katik Band Council and Band-owned Economic Development Corporation are designated buyers.
52. The Band Council may identify alternative designated buyers based on acceptance of proposals from independent companies.
53. All designated buyers will be expected to provide economic support to the community either through profit sharing or through an access fee established by the Band Council.
